This info sheet lists local, national and online resources that offer guidance on supporting children and young people at risk of exploitation.

[Escapeline](#) – a local charity who offer training, support, and guidance.

[Ivision Trust](#) - a national charity who offer telephone support and webinars for parents and carers.

[St Giles Trust](#) - information on the signs of exploitation and on police involvement. The Trust runs several peer hubs; there are currently none in the BCP area, but hubs elsewhere can be accessed by foster carers or where children are moving to live with a parent living within the catchment area.
