

## County Lines and Child Exploitation - Resources

This info sheet lists local, national and online resources that offer guidance on supporting children and young people at risk of exploitation.

<u>Escapeline</u> – a local charity who offer training, support, and guidance.

<u>Ivision Trust</u> - a national charity who offer telephone support and webinars for parents and carers.

<u>St Giles Trust</u> - information on the signs of exploitation and on police involvement. The Trust runs several peer hubs; there are currently none in the BCP area, but hubs elsewhere can be accessed by foster carers or where children are moving to live with a parent living within the catchment area.

<u>Action For Children - Child exploitation: what you need to know -</u> key points of what child exploitation is, and the signs to look out for.

<u>CEOP Education - Online Safety</u> - online safety resources for parents, carers and professionals, and for children aged 4-18.

<u>It's Not Okay - PACE (Parents Against Child Exploitation)</u> - a national campaign by Project Phoenix in Greater Manchester. The website has information for children and young people, parents, and professionals, including safety advice and lived experience stories.

<u>The Children's Society - Child Exploitation Programmes -</u> resources for parents, available in 17 languages. Also runs several programmes which are working nationally to improve strategies and responses to child exploitation.

<u>Marie Collins Foundation (technology-assisted sexual abuse)</u> - support and advocacy for victims of technology-assisted child sexual abuse. The website has practical guides for victims ages 9+ and their parents/carers. Also details training and events available for professionals.

<u>National Network to End Child Abuse</u> - child sexual abuse prevention infographics which can be downloaded, printed, or shared online. Also includes links to where to report.

<u>NSPCC - Social media</u> - guidance on keeping children safe on social media, including the risks, popular terminology, age ratings, and mental health impacts.

<u>Children's Commissioner - Keeping children safe online: why we must tackle misinformation and violence content</u> - discusses misinformation and violent content in the aftermath of the Southport attack, and how children are affected by misinformation. Includes some further links to resources on spotting fake news.

<u>Save The Children: 12 tips you can trust: talking to your children about racism</u> - advice on how to have an ongoing conversation with children about race, bias and stereotypes.
