From the Headmaster

As ever, the main focus of the term has been to ensure that we continue to prepare students in Years 11 and 13 for their impending public examinations. Students from both year groups have been sitting further practice examinations, assimilating the feedback and developing plans of action to address any identified weaknesses. There have also been a number of parents' evenings and a presentation to parents of Year 12 students about the process of applying for a place at university. Alongside these activities, colleagues have been continuing to develop their curriculum plans and teaching resources, and have been preparing for the implementation of a new assessment policy from September.

The highlight of this term was undoubtedly a team of students from Years 9 and 10 winning the National Cross-Country Final in Leeds. Until now, no team of students from a Dorset school had achieved this feat. Five years ago we had never taken a team to a National Final. Thanks to the efforts of our PE staff, seven teams have competed over the last four years. This competition is entered by hundreds of schools every year and the main contenders are typically schools from the independent sector. We are so proud of our staff and students.

In January, we launched a project to celebrate next year's 125th Anniversary of the School opening its doors. Whether an alum, a past or current member of our dedicated staff, or a friend of our school, we hope that as many individuals as possible will contribute in commemorating this event and celebrating the enduring legacy of Bournemouth School. At the end of February, we hosted a performance of the "Wasps' Nest" by local theatre group Vita Nova. It is intended that as a part of our personal development curriculum, all students in Year 8 will watch the play. Given the sensitivity of the material being covered, and to raise parents' awareness of County Lines, we offered parents the opportunity to attend an evening performance.

The play was written in response to the increasing dangers of County Lines (see https://www.nationalcrimeagency.gov.uk/what-we-do/crime-threats/drug-trafficking/county-lines), and includes the themes of knife crime and drug and alcohol addiction. Vita Nova is a community theatre group for those in recovery from drug and alcohol abuse (see: https://vitanova.co.uk/). The group's hard-hitting performance was followed by an opportunity to hear the actors' personal testimonies about the impact of addiction.

The aims of the production are to:

- offer an insight into how young people may be groomed and exploited by those involved in drug activity
- · increase awareness of triggers and warning signs of potential involvement with County Lines
- enable students to hear from individuals with experiences of addiction
- · increase students' awareness of the dangers and risks of carrying a knife
- explore the impact of social media and peer pressure on young people

The play was extremely well-received by those who attended. Unfortunately, for a variety of reasons, the performance to Year 8 have had to be postponed until after the public examinations have been held.

The end of the half term was marked by the Darwin/Turner charity week at Friday lunchtime. We are very grateful to everyone for contributing to the collections for charity and to the prefects for their organisation of the events.

Other notable events this term

- Assemblies to mark Holocaust Memorial Day, and Careers in Science Week
- Maths Challenges and Olympiads in Linguistics, Computing and the Sciences
- Trips to the Mayflower Theatre in Southampton for performances of "An Inspector Calls"
- Women's Business Breakfast, with inspirational guest speaker Padma Dayananda
- Half-term ski trip to Cerler, a high altitude, snow-sure resort in the Spanish Pyrenees in the region of Aragon
- Year 12 Politics trip to the Imperial War Museum and the Houses of Parliament
- Sixth form Art trip to the Tate Modern
- Life-saving training delivered to Years 8 and 9 by healthcare professionals from the RBH
- Music workshop at Poole Grammar School on Friday 7th March
- House competitions (including House Music, which was won by Scott House) and sports tournaments
- Guest speakers throughout the term (from for example, Dyson, Cardiff and Exeter Universities, etc)

As the term came to an end our CCF was inspected and we enjoyed our termly music concert. We were fortunate in having dry, albeit blustery, weather for our annual inspection. Following an impressive parade, the cadets engaged in a number of activities throughout the remainder of the day, show-casing the wide range of skills that they have been developing. Needless to say, the inspection was again passed with flying colours. The Spring Concert included pieces from a range of genres, with many featuring our Year 13 students; it has been a privilege to see such talented and motivated students develop during their time at the school.

Staffing changes

At the end of this term, Mrs Brown, our assistant librarian will be leaving us. Mrs Brown joined the school in September 2018, and has been of great support to Mrs Morgan in ensuring that the library has continued to flourish. Miss Lewis, one of our Pastoral Support Assistants, who joined us in January 2024 is also leaving the school next week to relocate and take up a similar position at Shrewsbury School. At the end of April, Dr Vine, who joined the science department in January 2016 will be retiring. We thank all three colleagues for their service and wish them well in their future endeavours.

The Beginning and End of the School Day

As you will no doubt be aware from the media coverage, all school budgets are under increasing pressure. Fortunately, due to careful financial management, we are not having to limit the number of subjects that are delivered, increase class sizes, or make staff redundant. We are not, however, entirely insulated from the financial pressures faced by all schools. To alleviate some of these pressures we have had to re-evaluate the provision for students before and after school. Consequently, from the beginning of next term, there will be some changes to when facilities and resources are available to students before and after the school day.

From Tuesday 22nd April, the following will apply:

Students may arrive at school **from 7.45 am**, entering the site through the green gates to the west of the main entrance (using their ID card to gain access). Students arriving from 7.45 am must remain in *Le Bistro* until 8.10 am. Students arriving between 8.10 and 8.25 may use the west and east entrances; those arriving late (i.e. after 8.25 am) may only use the main entrance. All students must leave the site **before 3.45 pm** unless they are involved in an activity directly supervised by a member of staff.

In addition to extra-curricular activities at the Sir David English Sports Centre, some facilities on the main site are also open to students after school. The school library is open on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday until **4.30 pm** and on Friday until **4 pm**. Students may use the computers in room 53 for independent study on Monday to Thursday until 4.30 pm and on Friday until 4 pm. Room 53 also accommodates our "Success Club" from 3.30pm to 4.30pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays for students who would like some additional support.

Facilities Improvements

- Security improvements have been made to the school's entrances; all staff and students must now use their ID cards to enter and exit the premises, drastically reducing the risk of unauthorised access to the site. Further improvements are planned via CCTV upgrades, and training for staff and students is under way for lockdown procedures, which will include a drill early next term.
- Exterior lighting around the site has been upgraded in a number of places with dusk-to-dawn/PIR activation as appropriate and LED fixtures.
- The canopy was completed ahead of schedule, with all works taking place within one week after Christmas. This addition has resulted in less crowding in Le Bistro at break- and lunchtimes, and students have appreciated the shelter during inclement weather. As the year progresses, we hope to make further use of this space for outdoor functions and events
- The lecture theatre has been completed and is now in use. Users of the theatre have appreciated the comfort of the seating, the warmth of the space and the clarity of both the audio and visual facilities.
- Works to refurbish some other aspects of the library/resources block has now been completed.
 These refurbished facilities include three new IT suites, two offices, and toilets for both students
 and staff (please see photos on the following page). We anticipate having the facility fully open
 and operational after Easter.
- We have submitted a bid to the Department for Education for the replacement of fire doors
 across the site, and are beginning to plan for some other improvement works to be undertaken
 before September.

















Year 7

Our Year 7 students continue to thrive and respond well to the challenges coming their way from both inside and outside the curriculum.

Attendance as a year group is a very impressive 97% and together they have accrued nearly 21,000 achievement points since the start of the academic year!

The boys continue to make every effort to embrace our school values of hard work, determination, smart appearance and respect, evidenced by the fact I compiled a very long list of names of students who deserved to receive a special letter of recognition either for their Attitude to Learning (ATL) or progress grades after the Spring progress reports were published. In some exceptional cases, students were singled out for praise for outstanding results in both aspects of academic life.

For Attitude to Learning, our expectation is that a student gets a B grade. This means they are behaving well in lessons, are ready to learn and are trying to complete all tasks to a high standard. Of the 2744 ATL grades given out by teachers to the Year 7 cohort, only 38 of them were "C"

grades, which shows that the boys are focused and working hard around school.

This term, Mrs Barnard-Dyson, from the careers department, worked in conjunction with the NHS to once again support the boys to enter a nation-wide competition to raise awareness of the various career opportunities available in the NHS. All students who entered received achievement points and the winning entry by Ojas L in 7N is shown opposite. This will now be submitted to the national competition – congratulations Ojas!

I regularly ask Year 7 Form Tutors to nominate Star Students – two per form – who have demonstrated the Bournemouth School values. Mrs Fengler (our Deputy Head of Year 7) looks forward to visiting these students and awarding them with a sticker, as well as sharing with the



class why they have been nominated by their Form Tutor. The aim is to recognise smart appearance, hard work, respect and determination. At the time of writing, the following students have received the recognition this term:

Year 8

The recent Spring progress reports highlighted how hard the Year 8 boys are working, and classrooms are calm, focused and industrious around the school.

Year 11

Our Year 11 students continue to grow as individuals and as a community as they take strides towards their GCSE exams, now seemingly just days away! Their character and kindness contribute to making Bournemouth School such a special place to be. 'The little things being the big things' is something that we often spotlight through form time and assemblies, and it is the superb team of Form Tutors: Mr Coward, Mrs Finch, Miss Hamalienko, Miss Hunt, Mr Sekhar and Mr Rixon, with support from our brilliant PSA Mrs Cornish, who personify this through their unrelenting care.

Miss Gosling and I draw inspiration from the efforts of our boys when they are at their best, both in and out of the classroom. Here are just some of the highlights from this term:

21 students have been awarded their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze level and 53 their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award.

Over the February half-term break, Alex F travelled to Thailand for his second-year 'Ror Dor' (ROTC) camp, held in Kanchanaburi. Over the three-day camp, he trained in static line parachuting, learning the full setup process and the correct procedure for jumping out of an aircraft. This intense training pushed him out of his comfort zone and gave him invaluable experience in discipline, teamwork, and overcoming psychological barriers. Before the camp, Alex spent four days at his yacht club, preparing video evidence for his GCSE PE coursework. During this time, he also taught international school students how to sail over three days. He guided them on land, coached them in the boat, and later supervised from the safety boat once they gained confidence. Alex reported that it was a rewarding experience to pass on his knowledge of sailing and help young sailors develop their skills on the water. More recently, Alex and his helm took part in the 420 Inland Championships at Rutland, finishing 7th out of 28 boats which included their first race win as a crew! This event was one of the main selection events for Team GBR. Their second qualifier at the Royal Southern Yacht Club comes just before Easter. Good luck Alex!

Leon H reports that our CCF sections are preparing well for Inspection Day, to which Year 11 are centrally involved. As of next year, current Year 11 students will be given senior roles as IC's. This means that they have been working hard to secure the promotions they have been aiming for. They are also supporting the leading of Inspection Day activities within their groups, through which they will be setting examples for Year 9 and 10 students who will be embarking on their first external inspection. This will involve the opportunity to potentially take part in the Honour Guard, representing the entire CCF section in front of the Inspecting Officer.



Our Year 11 football team enjoyed an eventful season coming to its end this term including both challenges and successes. A close encounter was sadly lost against Winton School but a 2-1 victory coming against LEAF Academy saw us finish second in the league!

Huge congratulations to Sam S and Jake S who represented our school cross country team in the senior boys category national finals in Leeds. Our senior boys team finished in 25th place which is an outstanding achievement given the incredibly high level of competition in the event.

Year 12 Spring Term News

As always, Year 12 have enjoyed a busy and fulfilling Spring term. In terms of our prefects, head of house, and society leads, it has been a pleasure to see students making the very best of leadership opportunities afforded to them and making a genuine difference within the school community. Year 12s have been fortunate to hear from several Year 13 students regarding apprenticeship and university preparation.

UCAS Evening

Wednesday, 12th March saw the Sixth Form Team launch the UCAS application process to Year 12 students and parents with an informative UCAS evening. This session guided parents through the UCAS hub, as well as the reforms to personal statements. This was then followed up with a talk from Surrey University during Wednesday enrichment, which explained how to decide on courses and destinations. Hopefully, this has now set students in good stead ahead of the Spring/Summer terms, where they will continue to receive support and guidance ahead of application submissions in December/January.

A fortnightly newsletter, *Next Steps*, is now going out to Year 12 parents with information and key dates, so that parents are aware what their child should be working towards now. We have also devised a fun activity with the aim to encourage students to engage in some research into possible pathways. The goal is for students to fill in a row, column, or diagonal line of research in the weeks to come. Year 12 students should pop into the study centre when they have crossed off a line, so that we can reward them.

Congratulations to Lucy J who has been selected for the Southwest England volleyball team. This is a phenomenal achievement as only 12 players out of the whole of the southwest are selected. As a result, Lucy has an interregional championship in May half-term in Kettering where she will be representing southwest, and all the matches are live streamed on YouTube.

We also wanted to celebrate the achievements of Xavier J in 12 Moore. Xavier has always been a keen athlete, representing Bournemouth School in a variety of sporting activities. However, for quite some time, he has also been dedicating much of his time and making great strides in the sport of rowing. He has already achieved several accolades and achievements. Last year, he was joint winner of the Under 19 Men's Four Nations Beach Sprints Series. He was one of only five Under 19 men (with him being the youngest) selected for the Great Britain Beach Sprints team for the World Rowing Championships in Genoa, Italy, which took place at the start of last term. This year, Xavier has also successfully completed the British Rowing Diploma, and most recently, he was one of only four Under 19 men selected to row for Great Britain at Coupe de la Jeunesse in Los Alcázares, Spain. The dedication and perseverance that such achievement must take is inspiring and we wish Xavier all the best of luck with this in the future.

Finn S. recently played in the 2025 Masters section of the Isle of Wight International Chess Tournament. The tournament consisted of 9 rounds 6 days. For each game, each player had 90 minutes play time with a 30 second increment per move. Finn joined the tournament with an international rating of 1887 and being the 107th seed. He ended the tournament with 5/9, putting him in tied 33rd place, with his tiebreaks making him 39th. He gained a 134 rating, raising his international rating to 2021. Additionally, he gained a 65 national rating, bringing his national rating to 2163, thus making him the highest rated chess player in Dorset! Some of his best results in the tournament include beating FM Neil Dickenson who had an international rating of 2283 and drawing IM Jovanka Houska who had an international rating of 2344 and who is also the highest rated woman chess player in Britain along with being the 9-time British Women's Chess Champion. Huge congratulations to Finn on his success!

We have a lot of fantastically talented dancers in the Sixth Form, specialising in different forms of dance. Antony D. has been performing across the country in recent weeks, most recently dancing in the Peggy Hawkins fundraising gala. Elsewhere, Pranav B recently performed at a local cultural event in tribute to a legendary Malayalee playback singer P Jayachandran. Pranav performed one of his most popular songs before moving into high-energy Bollywood/Punjabi, Tamil and Malayalam tracks.

Netflix's series "Adolescence"

Many of you may have seen Netflix's series "Adolescence", which has received praise for its cinematography and acting. However, its core message is even more significant. This 4-part series delves into the reality of child knife crime in the UK and its connections to misogyny and Incel culture. If you have not seen it you may have heard about it in the press, on social media and on the national news. As a school, it's crucial that we provide students with a safe space to express their concerns and educate them on these issues. The guide below explains some of the language used.

Incel Culture parent guide



The recent **Netflix drama Adolescence** has highlighted the troubling rise of incel (involuntary celibate) communities and their influence on young people. As a parent, it is important to understand this online subculture, recognise warning signs, and engage in open conversations with your child. This guide explains incel ideology, key terms, signs to look out for, and conversation starters to help you support your child. You can find further support on our website.

What is an incel?



The term **incel** stands for 'involuntary celibate' and refers to men who believe they are unable to form romantic or sexual relationships despite wanting to. Some incel communities foster resentment towards women, blaming them for their perceived misfortune. These forums (often online) can promote misogyny, victimhood, and, in extreme cases, radicalisation.

Key Incel Terminology

Red Pill – From The Matrix, refers to 'waking up' to the 'truth' of gender dynamics, as incels perceive them.

Chad - An attractive, successful man who is desirable to all women.

Stacy – An attractive woman who is seen as prioritising men like Chad.

Becky - An average woman, often contrasted with a Stacy.

Femoid/Foid - A dehumanising term, implying women are inferior.

Black Pill - Belief that nothing changes with self improvement or effort.

80/20 Rule – A theory suggesting that 80% of women are attracted to 20% of men, fuels resentment.

Andrew Tate - A key promoter of incel ideology.

Signs to Look Out For:

- Low self-esteem
- Use of incel language
- Hostility towards women
- Isolation and secrecy
- Increased frustration & anger



Conversation Starters:

- What do you think makes a healthy relationship?
- Do you think it's fair to blame one group of people for personal difficulties?
- How do you decide whether something you read online is trustworthy?

One of the many key messages from this series is to consider that students may not openly share if bad things are happening to them. This could be due to fear of repercussions. There is a video you can watch that shows the importance of looking out for signs Are You Listening? It is important not to panic and think that if you notice some of these things then your child must be getting criminally exploited! These are indicators and at the very least may offer you a platform to discuss what your child is being exposed to/ doing in the on-line world that so many of our young people move around in. As a school we are frequently exploring additional ways to enhance education and training on these topics for both staff and students. If you have any concerns about anything please refer to the school website where there are links to outside agencies, or you can speak to your child's Tutor or one of the safeguarding team.

Parental support for parents with a child who is at risk of or experiencing criminal exploitation

<u>Escapeline</u> is a local charity who offer training, support, and guidance on preventing child exploitation.

<u>Ivision Trust</u> is a national charity who offer telephone support and webinars for parents and carers.

<u>St Giles Trust</u> is a national charity. Their website contains lots of information on the signs of exploitation and on police involvement. The Trust runs several peer hubs, but there are currently none in the BCP area, so they cannot provide face to face support here. However, we can access the hubs for foster carers, or where children are moving to live with a parent living within the catchment area of a hub.

Prevent Radicalisation and Extremism by Acting Early

It can be hard to know what to do if somebody you know is expressing extreme views or hatred towards groups within society. Family and friends are often the first to spot worrying changes taking place. A level Polítics Tríp to the Imperial War Museum and the Houses of Parliament, March 2025



Philosophy Religion and Ethics (PRE)


In February half term some of the Year 12 RS A level students went to London after being chosen to take part in a lecture series held at the Institute of Philosophy. Students heard lectures on:





Learning to Learn – Starts at School, continues for Life

It is no secret that our educational system is currently under intensive scrutiny; educationalists, parents and employers are all questioning whether the curriculum is truly fit for purpose in best preparing our young people to progress into adulthood. The outcome of a school education can be considered in terms of the Social Capital and Economic Capital. Social Capital includes the ability to forge relationships, discern right from wrong, a strong sense of identity and place, respect and tolerance of others and kindness. Economic Capital is measured not just in the qualifications gained but also the vital 'soft skills' such as communication, teamwork, creative thinking, initiative and problem-solving.

Peter Hyman, ex-political strategist and headteacher recently commented in the New European magazine that the existing curriculum and regime of schools can often lead to students 'parking Initiative at the School Gate' where the only problem-solving required was how to scoff one's lunch within the 30 minutes allotted¹. As the school's Careers Adviser, whilst I have the luxury of being impartial and independent, staff may be relieved to know that this article is not going to be a line-by-line critique of our educational system. Instead, I want to briefly highlight the many ways in which the system can indeed help prepare students to transition into adult life and the world of work.

I have the privilege of delivering individual career conversations with all of Year 10 and all of Year 12 students. In those 40 minute encounters, I often gain invaluable insights into their individual experiences of the school environment. One of the frequent comments I hear is 'what's the point of x, I'm never going to use it?' Or perhaps, 'why do I need to understand poetry or analyse texts written centuries ago?' This is where I can make a difference by re-framing their thinking. When a student is grappling with a piece of text, or trying to understand a poem and what the author is trying to convey, they are developing generic critical analysis and communication skills – skills which, by their generic nature, can be applied in a myriad of different situations. Who is the author – what is the context of the piece – what is his/her lived experience – is there a bias or message being imparted? These critical questioning skills can serve a student when confronted with any new information in any work or social situation – especially relevant in the context of the rise in misinformation within social media.

Peter Hyman also talks of the importance of developing oracy skills – listening and speaking. Whenever there is a class discussion, or a group work activity, students have the opportunity to exercise and develop these skills. Work experience can also help nurture these social skills – the confidence to actively listen and ask questions to confirm understanding. Even, dare I say it, the careers conversation is another opportunity for the student to demonstrate listening and speaking skills and I am pleased to say that the vast majority do!

There is a more fundamental response to the 'what's the point' question though – whether it be Geography, Maths, Physics, RS, in each case the student is learning how to learn – developing the skills of curiosity, perseverance, checking, research, consulting with others and literally hunger for knowledge acquisition, that will help prepare them for the future. There is a mantra in Careers Guidance circles of 'lifelong learning', an attitude of perpetual curiosity that equips one to successfully navigate the career journey. Our workplace is evolving at a pace unparalleled in recent times. The rise of technology, and in particular AI, is transforming and will continue to transform the nature, type and content of work. Just as existing jobs will be modified or complemented by AI, others will disappear, and crucially new ones will come to the fore along with the new skills required to fulfil them. At school, nurturing that appetite and openness to learning, not just of the popular subjects, but of all subjects, will be an excellent preparation – after all, in life and in work there will often be tasks that one would rather not do, but are required to; so as I used to say back in those City days, 'JDI' – just do it, and move on.

Whilst Peter Hyman may have a point regarding the rigidity of the school curriculum and timetable, and the risk of literally stifling creativity and individualism, this can be significantly offset by the enrichment activities and societies offered by schools. CCF, the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme, work experience opportunities, are all fantastic opportunities to nurture those soft skills of creativity, problem-solving, initiative, and perseverance. In the sixth form here, there are numerous societies covering different themes. Alongside work experience, there are opportunities for local volunteering, which can help develop social skills, teamworking and build self-confidence. There are visiting speakers from different careers and professions, such as dentistry, or engineering; whilst attendance is optional, I cannot stress enough the value of engaging with these events and getting used to speaking to the representatives – cultivate that curiosity so that instead of saying, 'I'm not going, I don't want to work in engineering', try the response 'let's see what they have to say'.

There is a Business Breakfast event for women in business coming soon. Whilst it might be tempting to decide whether to attend purely on the basis of interest in any of the speakers' current jobs, the real value of attending will be hearing about their journeys – careers aren't decided at 18, progressing unchanged until retirement. Find out about each speaker's journey, the unexpected twists and turns, how they coped with setbacks and took risks as new unexpected opportunities arose.

In short, let that curiosity push doors; I often advise adults looking to pivot away from current roles to push doors – see if they open. Many won't – the rejected application, the promising interview that didn't result in a job offer – the application with no response at all – but keep pushing, and eventually that door will open. Nurture and develop that curiosity and perseverance now, both in one's curriculum subjects and enrichment opportunities, and it will equip you for life.

Combined Cadet Force (CCF)

So far this academic year, the cadets have been busy with plenty of opportunities for all to take part. The contingent has once again demonstrated its excellence as one of the top CCF units in the country. The younger cadets have shown their ability to quickly learn new skills, while the senior cadets have put these skills into practice. Through leadership, teamwork, and communication they have passed down their knowledge by training and guiding the junior cadets.

The Navy section has successfully organised and scheduled a record number of activities. Cadets had the opportunity to visit the Navy's new aircraft carrier, HMS Queen Elizabeth, as well as our parent ship, HMS Portland, providing them with valuable insights into naval operations. During Exercise Swallows and Amazons, cadets sailed out of Portsmouth on naval yachts—a memorable experience we hope to repeat later this year as the weather improves. After the Easter holidays, a visit to the Damage Repair Instructional Unit in Portsmouth is planned, where cadets will learn critical skills such as repairing a sinking ship and preventing compartments from flooding.

The Army section has had a busy and exciting year. Earlier, cadets visited Bovington Camp, where they explored the Royal Wessex Yeomanry's Challenger II battle tanks and trained on tank simulators. More recently, a group of new Army recruits, led by their NCOs, took part in the Great Tommy Sleep Out at the school. This event put their newly learned skills to the test as they set up camp in the woodland behind the school, cooked their own meals using military-issue rations, and spent the night sleeping in bashas. Their hard work made the event a great success, raising over £1,600 for the Royal British Legion to support homeless veterans. Meanwhile, the senior Army cadets participated in a range day, where all but one met the requirements for their Marksman qualification, demonstrating impressive shooting skills.

The RAF section has secured a strong number of air experience flying slots and a gliding session so far this year. Fortunately, the weather has been on our side, allowing more sessions to go ahead compared to last year. In January, 15 cadets visited RAF Brize Norton, where they explored various squadrons and toured the airfield of the largest RAF station. Meanwhile, the section's senior cadets competed in the Royal Air Squadron Trophy regional event at Blandford Camp, achieving an impressive 4th place in the South West. While this result wasn't enough to qualify for the national finals, it was a fantastic achievement given the high level of competition.
