### From the Headmaster

The term began with Year 12 students sitting examinations before embarking upon a week's work experience. Thanks to the efforts of Mr Riddles and Mrs Barnard-Dyson virtually all Year 12 and Year 10 students experienced a work placement during the term. This is an invaluable opportunity for our students to experience the world of work. Subsequently, we invited employers to a "Business Breakfast". The event proved successful, with a particular highlight being the student presentations, recounting and reflecting upon their experiences.

Also, thanks largely to the efforts of Mrs Barnard-Dyson, our Year 12 students have had the opportunity to attend a number of talks and workshops to help them shape their future plans. Our guests have included lawyers, doctors, dentists, engineers, a biochemist, representatives from universities and others who are working in finance and banking. Students have also attended a workshop on how to use social media effectively, an event for aspiring medics and a networking exercise that was well-supported by parents. It is particularly gratifying that so many of our former students are willing to return to school to advise those currently with us. As the half term progressed, Geography fieldwork for Years 10 and 12 began – the weather was rarely perfect, with some activities having to be curtailed either due to the excessive heat or to torrential rainfall! Throughout the term, students were encouraged to enter a number of competitions: the Year 10 Scientific Thinking Competition, the Year 9-11 Programming Competition, maths challenges (all year groups) and the UK Youth Rocketry Challenge. These were in addition to the usual inter-house events, and sporting competitions (details of some impressive achievements may be found in our newsletter). The most significant trip this term was to Berlin. Forty-eight Year 9 students participated, visiting some key sites such as the Sachsenhausen Memorial, the Berlin Wall, the DDR Museum and the Reichstag, as well as having the opportunity to practise their language skills. I am particularly grateful to Ms Fengler, Mr Bonds, Mr Graham, Mr Marshall and Mrs Wallis for accompanying the trip.

Thanks also to all colleagues who arranged and supervised the activities.

The focus of the second half of term has inevitably been upon ensuring that our Year 11 and 13 students are supported in sitting their GCSE and A level examinations, respectively. I am grateful to Mrs Critchley and her team of invigilators for ensuring the smooth running of the public examinations, which appears to be more complex year on year. Year 11 students celebrated the end of their examinations with a Prom held at the Highcliff Marriott Hotel. We were pleased to be able to work with BSG and their PSA to ensure that the event was without incident and enjoyed by all.

On the evening of Thursday 26 June, we welcomed parents and students new to the school from September into school. It was a pleasure to meet new members of our community face-to-face, share with them our expectations of our new students. The following day saw all students return for a day of induction, which included a number of team-building activities and an opportunity for them to get to know their tutor and their way around school.

This week, Year 8 students participated in team-building activities and a workshop on addressing sexual harassment. The team-building activities were organised and run by the senior cadets of the Combined Cadet Force, with the workshop delivered by a team from STARS (Sexual Trauma and Recovery Services) and the police. Our students were joined by students from BSG for the team-building activities.

This week we have also had the pleasure of hearing from Mrs Franklin and Mr Block from Bournemouth School for Girls in our assemblies to launch their production of "Legally Blonde – the Musical". The performances will be towards the end of January 2026, with auditions planned for early in the new academic year. Whilst very grateful to our colleagues for giving our students the opportunity to become involved in the production, we believe it prudent to limit participation to students in Years 7-10 and 12.

In the penultimate full week of term, our annual Open Evening was very well-attended. More than 500 families toured the school; at the time of writing around 420 boys have already been registered for the test in September. On Friday we enjoyed our annual House Events and Sports' Day at King's Park. A number of long-standing school records were broken, the weather was superb, our students' behaviour impeccable, and the event was even blessed by the brief appearance of the Red Arrows! We were grateful for the help of a number of former students and the continuing support of Tony Bernard of the Steve Bernard Foundation.

This week, 60 CCF cadets will be attending an army camp, Year 8 students will experience "The Wasps' Nest", our Culture and Awards Evening is on Thursday, and our local MP, Tom Hayes, will be visiting to gain an insight into the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. Term finishes for students on Tuesday 22 July at 3.20 pm.

The role of a headteacher is impossible without the support of governors, staff and parents. So many staff have "gone that extra mile" to support our students this year – far too many to thank individually. My senior leadership team colleagues in particular have again continued to work tirelessly to ensure that our provision for students is as effective as it can be.

It continues to be a privilege to serve the Bournemouth School community and I believe that we can all look to the future with optimism. I hope that everyone has a relaxing, enjoyable and very well-deserved holiday!

### **Facilities update**

As we draw near the end of another academic year, I look back over the achievements of the last 12 months with pride. Alongside our continued focus upon improving the quality of teaching and learning, we have refurbished our lecture theatre and some toilets, created three new IT suites, installed a canopy adjacent to Le Bistro, and improved site security. The impact of last year's heating and air conditioning project has been felt over recent weeks; without air conditioning working in a number of our classrooms would have been unbearable in the heatwaves.

I am pleased to report that the school remains in a strong financial position compared to other similar schools. Careful financial planning enables us to continue to improve the School's facilities. Such improvements will enable us to continue to secure high levels of student numbers (in Year 7 and in the Sixth Form), even when the local demographics change.

A significant programme of works is planned for the forthcoming summer holiday, which in addition to the redecoration of some areas, includes.

- continuing toilet refurbishments (at rear of hall for students and staff)
- replacement of carpets (ground floor)
- improving road surfaces at front and to the rear of the school
- improved signage

#### Replacement of fire doors

Over the May half term, we received confirmation that our Condition Improvement Fund (CIF) bid was successful, and we were awarded the full amount requested. Despite the tight timescales caused by the late decision by the Department for Education, the contractors remain confident that the majority of works to replace all fire doors across the school site can be completed before the end of the next academic year.

### Windows 11 rollout

With Microsoft's decision to cease support for Windows 10, we have no choice but to upgrade many of the school's computers which are unable to run the new operating system. Wherever existing computers are able to run it, Windows 11 will be installed over the summer holiday by the IT support team.

### Future possibilities

In the summer of 2026, we hope to continue a programme of classroom redecoration, and to refurbish more of our toilets, areas within design technology and two laboratories (hopefully accessing funding from the Wolfson Foundation). With a view to longer-term cost savings, we are currently exploring the possibility of upgrading lighting across the site to LED fixtures, with room presence detectors. This should mean that running costs decrease, and lights will turn off automatically after a predetermined period of time if movement is not detected.

# Summer Examination Series - 2025 GCE A level and GCSE Result Day Information

The invigilators and I would like to congratulate every student on their attitude, behaviour and commitment towards their public examinations this summer. We would like to wish them luck for their results days and all the best for their future achievements.

### **Results Days:**

Students are able to collect their results from Le Bistro (using the gates to the upper terrace) on the following dates and times:

GCE A level/AS level: Thursday 14th August, 2025

The school will open for collection between 8am - 9.30am

GCSE: Thursday 21st August, 2025

The school will open for collection between 9am - 10.30am

On both occasions senior staff, as well as myself, will be on hand to support and advise students with any queries.

Results will also be emailed to the **student's school account**. If a student wishes to nominate somebody to collect them on their behalf, they will need to give written authorisation. The nominated person will need to bring identification with them. Please email me with the details.

If a student is unhappy with their grade(s), there will be an opportunity to speak to a member of staff in school or via email. Please note that some staff may not access emails in the school holidays.

Students can access a copy of their exam script before deciding if they should request a review. To do so, the school will request <u>candidate consent</u> via a consent form before any review is requested. The school will share the outcome of each stage of the process with you promptly. Forms will be available on the website.

Please note, the deadline for priority A level reviews is 21<sup>st</sup> August, 2025.

\*\* It is important to note that during the appeals stages, results could go up or down or stay the same. You will not keep the higher of the grades, and an appeal cannot be withdrawn once a decision has been made \*\*

I look forward to seeing everyone on results day. I appreciate it may be a time of anxiety, but the school is here to support students and to help them achieve their potential.

### Bournemouth School Library News

Our students and staff's continued enthusiasm and support for the library has been wonderful, and a staggering **20,214** books have been issued during this academic year.

Students continue to demonstrate their zest for reading, entering the numerous House reading competitions and library events with enthusiasm:

- 200 Bookbuzz books gifted to all Year 7 students.
- 157 novels and short stories were read as part of the Y9 Dystopian Literature house competition, which saw Newton House named champions.
- The **Bournemouth School Great Book Bake Off** for **World Book Day** was simply incredible. The top prize was awarded to **Noah (8N)** for his rendition of the Sandworm from Frank Herbert's *Dune* series, and a worthy second-place went to **Ethan (7T)** for his creative traybake inspired by Louis Sachar's *Holes*.
- £121.36 raised in the inaugural World Book Day book sale.
- All Year 7 and 8 students took part in the Million Minutes Reading Challenge, logging an astounding total of 169,068 reading minutes during March. Congratulations to Scott House who took the top spot and the house points after reading an impressive 40,565 minutes. Viraaj (7N) and Ethan (8S) were crowned Champion Readers for logging the most individual minutes of the competition, reading an impressive 7,269 minutes collectively.
- There were 40 Dungeon's and Dragons Creative Competition entries this year, Jack (11E) took the accolade of House Champion with the creation of a unique and detailed player class called *The Corrupted*, and Moore House were victorious as House D&D champions.
- During October staff and students helped the library create over 250 poppies from recycled plastic bottles, so a field of remembrance for Bournemouth School students and staff who lost their lives during World War I and World War II could be planted.

The library continues to host a number of lunchtime and after school clubs for all year groups:

- **Warhammer Club** members have painted and battled with over 30 miniatures, and are coordinating a new after school club to run 40K battle campaigns.
- **Dungeons & Dragons** adventurers gather after school, with student dungeon masters running numerous successful quests for over 70 students this year.
- Our Year 7 and 8 lunchtime **Book Club** have enjoyed and read together: *I Am Wolf* by Alastair Chisholm and *Squirm* by Carl Hiaasen.
- After a considerable amount of time and hard work five students submitted performances to the Poetry By Heart national recital competition. Josh (8N), Petya (8E) and Fabrice (8E) undertook the challenge of crafting a freestyle performance, and Aarav (9E) and Krishang (10M) entered the classic: 2-poem competition. All of the performances were awarded Highly Commended by the competition judges.

# Reflections on Work Experience with Bournemouth West MP Jessica Toale

I chose to do my work experience with my local Bournemouth West MP because it sounded like an incredible opportunity for so many reasons. Being able to understand and see how an MP's office functions from day to day, what kind of work they have to do, how they have a tangible effect on the local community and how they support Jessica while she's in Parliament was an opportunity I could not pass up.

My week had a busy schedule and was well organised to ensure there was never a moment where I had nothing to do. I worked with all the different members of Jessica's team during the week and even got to visit her in parliament on one day.

While in the office, I worked with Jessica's caseworkers, seeing how they help our local citizens on a more local level, as well as working with her communications team who help Jessica connect with and relate information to her constituents. They are incredibly committed to providing help and are determined to give every constituent the best possible service they can provide.

### **Parliamentary business**

I saw how Jessica's schedule is organised and just quite how busy she is. The team also gave me a project to work on for any moments where I had no other work to do which made for a well-planned week where I was never bored. I researched and wrote up a report on the Assisted Dying Bill to help inform Jessica on the proposed Amendments to it. Getting to see my own work have any kind of impact on legislation was something I never thought would happen.

During my week, I was able to visit Jessica in Parliament, which included a personal tour of the houses themselves which are truly fascinating. I watched in on question time on the Government's plans for energy security and net zero which taught me a lot about the future for our country's energy resources. Just getting a feel for how parliament runs, and all the traditions and culture within the building, was surreal.

### **Constituency visits**

Finally, I shadowed Jessica on the Friday when she returned to the constituency to see how she builds relations with the community. This involved going to a round table with local business owners at Barclays Bank, which was a great chance to meet some incredible people from the local area. We also visited a local primary school and got a feel for how they operate and the areas they struggle with, and ways Jess could help them, both at local and governmental level.

Overall, my experience was truly inspiring. I met so many hard working and passionate people and discovered just how determined Jessica and her team are to tackle issues in our local area and make the UK a better place in its entirety. I was able to develop my social skills and my ability to interact with people I've only just met and deepened my knowledge on the political landscape of the UK. It was a great experience which filled me with hope and taught me so much.

#### **Athletics**

We have enjoyed another action-packed summer of athletics, featuring events such as the County Trials, Track and Field Cup, County Championships, and Town Sports. A number of students have achieved personal bests, earned county champion titles, and represented Dorset at the South West Championships.

Notably, Barney (Year 9, 800m) and Arlo (Year 11, 400m Hurdles) have both met the entry standard for the prestigious English Schools Championships and have been selected to represent Dorset in Birmingham on 11-12<sup>th</sup> July. This event is the largest schools' athletics competition in the world, involving athletes from all 47 counties of England.

We also celebrate our continued success in the Track and Field Cup, with this being the fourth consecutive year we have had teams reach the regional round at Millfield. ### Careers Information

### **Work Experience**

A highlight of the summer term is our Year 10 and Year 12 students completing work experience placements. This year, *every single student* in both year groups (378 in total) took part in an inperson placement during two dedicated weeks in April and May. In a time when many schools are increasingly opting for virtual work experience, we are proud to continue offering meaningful, on-site opportunities for all. We strongly believe that being physically present in a workplace – navigating new environments, interacting with a range of professionals, and adapting to unfamiliar routines – offers an invaluable learning experience that cannot be replicated online.

Students were placed in a wide variety of sectors, including healthcare, education, law, retail, engineering, the arts and more, giving them real insight into potential future careers. Many returned with increased confidence, a better understanding of the workplace, and a clearer sense of their ambitions beyond school.

In addition to the main placement weeks, a number of Year 12 students are also undertaking dayrelease placements that run throughout the year. These longer-term experiences offer sustained, in-depth exposure to a particular field and are especially valuable for students who want to build meaningful connections and develop their skills over time.

Following the placements, we were delighted to invite host employers into school for a Business Breakfast event to thank them for their support. They had the opportunity to hear directly from students, who gave thoughtful and enthusiastic testimonials about their experiences. It was a fantastic way to celebrate the success of the programme and highlight the impact that employer partnerships can have on students' personal and professional development.

### **NORCO Composites – From Work Experience to the Classroom**

We were also delighted to welcome Tobi Kretzschmar from NORCO Composites into school. Two of our Year 10 students, Jayden and Emil, had recently completed a work experience placement at NORCO, where they were involved in a hands-on engineering project. Tobi visited their class to present them with the finished carbon fibre aircraft components they had produced – a fantastic way to celebrate their achievement and bring the learning full circle.

While in school, Tobi also gave a careers talk about his own journey and the range of exciting opportunities available in STEM fields, particularly within advanced manufacturing and composites. His visit helped to demonstrate the real-world impact of work experience and inspired many students to consider careers in engineering and design.



### **Dyson Workshops and STEM Inspiration**

We were thrilled to welcome back former student Aleks Rogers, who delivered a series of engaging, workshopstyle sessions to students in Years 7 and 12, as well as members of our Engineering Society.

The sessions focused on robotics-based problem-solving activities, encouraging students to think creatively and work collaboratively. Aleks also shared insights into his work with the Dyson Foundation, offering students a valuable glimpse into real-world engineering and innovation.

# The Importance of Building Resilience for Tomorrow's Workforce

We hear a lot about the importance of instilling resilience in today's young people, in part to address the rising incidence of reported mental health issues. I regularly research different aspects of the labour market to help prepare students for the challenges and opportunities they will face when they leave fulltime education. Mindful of the importance of building resilience, I recently looked at how this is playing out in the current workforce. What I discovered shocked me and indeed shocks many labour market commentators.

In the tax year 2023/24, according to the Health and Safety Executive, stress, depression and anxiety accounted for 49% of the total working days lost due to self-certificated ill health, that's 16.4 million days. On average, each person suffering took 21.1 days off work for this set of mental health conditions. Is this indicative of the need to build resilience in our workforce? Or does it say something more fundamental about the nature and type of work many people are engaged in today?

### The Impact of Technology driving 'Work Intensification'

It is widely accepted that technology has accelerated the amount of work individuals are expected to do. The authors of an academic study 'Working Still Harder' acknowledge this, citing modern management techniques of closer control and discipline, such as management by targets, all contributing to workplace stress.

In the recent BBC Radio 4 Series, Payslip Britain, Dr Amanda Jones, Senior Lecturer at Kings College London, argued that this trend in work intensification can also contribute to feelings of isolation, not just when remote working, but also in the office. This can result in less available time to make meaningful connections both inside and out of work. This isolation can in turn contribute to raising stress levels and the attendant related health conditions. The Payslip Britain series also suggested that this general increase in work-related stress and pressure has contributed to many older workers, not yet having reached retirement age, leaving work and adding to the rising 'economically inactive' figures.

Academic studies have looked at the role 'workplace curiosity' plays in levels of stress, anxiety and depression at work. They found that workers who exhibit the workplace curiosity dimension of 'stress tolerance' (the ability to cope with new, uncertain, complex and ambiguous situations) appear less susceptible to stress. However, the workplace curiosity of 'deprivation sensitivity' (the desire to fill information gaps) were more susceptible. With our education system's focus on assessment by exams, it is tempting to see how 'deprivation sensitivity' is more likely to be cultivated amongst our young people.

Anecdotally, a senior director of a major Investment Bank recently told me that it was 'always the high-flyers who suffer premature burn-out'. Their continual striving for perfection meant that they consistently over-committed themselves in terms of their workloads. They too exhibit the characteristic of 'deprivation sensitivity'.

Some companies have attempted to address issues like work/life balance, for example Ernst & Young (EY), who is actively exploring and implementing flexible working models, including the four-day work week, as part of its commitment to supporting employee well-being and work-life balance. However, critics of work/life balance policies claim that they are skewed towards professional 'white collar' roles, ignoring lower paid/skills jobs with more precarious financial situations.

### **Building Resilience in tomorrow's workforce**

If we are largely powerless to influence the nature and content of work, then our agency lies in how we can prepare our young people to cope and still thrive in their future careers.

The British Council's Next Generation UK report, published in 2024, recommended that professionals working in the education system should ensure that building the resilience of young people – social, emotional, and financial – is embedded at all levels. It further added that the current curriculum needed to be re-balanced away from a narrow focus on examinations and academic routes, embedding wider life skills into the school curriculum. The report concluded that by improving resilience, our young people will be able to develop a robustness to the challenges of modern life and work.

Dr Jones proposed that schools and colleges can help better prepare young people for this age of work intensification by developing skills in collaboration, cognitive empathy and the ability to forge meaningful interactions.

Progressive management systems recognise that failure is an integral part of learning. However, our current exam system for academic qualifications instils a permanency of pass/fail assessment. This can create a fear of failure because it allows no scope for re-assessment. The school system attempts to circumvent this by continual testing, mock exams etc., to offer opportunities for the student to respond and learn from mistakes before the real thing. In the careers guidance session, acknowledgement of the testing process can be used as a motivator for the student, especially if they are discouraged by recent poor marks. When exploring potential career ideas, where the student has most agency is in their preparedness to put the work in to gain their optimal grades, thereby keeping their future options as wide as possible. By re-framing poor test results as a positive learning opportunity rather than a failure, resilience begins to be nurtured. This plays into the Growth Mindset, which is a recognised part of an overall strategy for building resilience in young people.

In terms of the broader scope of building resilience, many of the components are best achieved through embedded practices within the school (and home) environment. Factors such as encouraging problem-solving activities, building emotional intelligence (EQ), fostering collaborative working, and promoting self-care are achieved through ongoing experiences.

The challenge for me and my fellow careers guidance professionals is to nurture resilience in our clients; not just for the approach to seeking that first job after completing education, but also in how they face the day-to-day realities of the workplace thereafter. But this is not solely my responsibility – it is a shared responsibility between the education system, parents, and perhaps most importantly, employers themselves.
